House panel calls for emergency meeting on 'transpo crisis'

MANILA -- The House Committee on Transportation is set to hold an emergency meeting on Wednesday with all stakeholders in the transport sector to find solutions to ease the "transportation crisis" caused by the suspension of the Light Rail Transit 2

(LRT-2) operations.

In a statement on Tuesday, Samar Rep. Edgar Mary Sarmiento, committee chair, said he has called for the meeting hoping to find the "quickest, most doable and most practical solution to fill the vacuum" caused by the disruption

of the line's operations and the ongoing repair of the South Luzon Expressway (SLEX),

Right-of-way for LRT-1 Cavite Extension project almost finished

MANILA—The Light Rail Transit Authority (LRTA) announced on Tuesday the delivery of right-of-way for the Light Rail Transit Line 1 (LRT-1) Cavite Extension is almost complete and partial operability of the project by end of 2021 is on track.

In a statement, the company said one pipe from Maynilad, telecommunications (telco) and cable facilities

of six companies, and 18 lots of three landowners remain before the acquisition of the right-of-way of the project is at 100 percent.

According to Maynilad, its 1,100-mm. pipe will be relocated once the Cavite Infrastructure Corporation (CIC) issues a permit—which the CIC promised to deliver before November 1.

Since Maynilad, the

CIC, and the Light Rail Manila Corporation (LRMC)—the build-operate-maintain project contractor of the LRT-1 Cavite Extension—are all subsidiaries of Manny Pangilinan-led Metro Pacific Investments Corporation (MPIC), the LRTA is confident no delays would arise from the relocation of the pipeline.

Meanwhile, representatives of Cable Link, Eastern Telecoms,

Globe Telecom, PLDT, Radius Telecoms, and Sky Cable committed to relocate or cut their remaining telco and cable facilities within October.

"Whatever remaining utilities may already be cut to give way to LRMC's constructions works, especially the movement of its rigs," the LRTA said.

Other obstructions such as plant boxes, lamp posts, traffic signals, and closed-circuit television

permits allowing the start of civil works within the 18 remaining lots will be issued within October by their three landowners: Philippine Reclamation Authority for 16 lots, Puregold and D.M. Wenceslao for one lot each.

"With the cooperation of all the above stakeholders, the 19-years delayed LRT-1 Cavite Extension Project, which is expected to service up to 800,000 per day, is finally on track to partial operations by the end of 2021," the LRTA said.

On Sept. 1, the LRMC started the excavation, drilling, and

piling works of the LRT-1 Cavite Extension and on Sept. 18 started substructure concreting works.

Last May, Pangilinan ordered the partial operability of the Cavite extension "a full year before 2022" which will cover the first seven kilometers and five stations of the project.

Once completed, the PHP64.9 billion project will extend the LRT-1 from the existing Baclaran station southward to the future Niyog station in Bacoor, Cavite—about 11.7 kilometers in length with eight additional stations. (PNA)

Regulatory Board (LTFRB, the Light Railway Transit Authority (LRTA), Metropolitan Manila Development Authority (MMDA), Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), Philippine National Police-Highway Patrol Group (PNP-HPG), Light Rail Manila Corporation (LRMC), SLEX management and city bus operators.

Sarmiento said the suspension of the LRT-2 operations, which could last up to nine months for its Santolan-Anonas segment, could affect the mobility of at least 200,000 passengers daily, noting that the government must provide the affected commuters with alternative transportation.

"We are talking about hundreds of thousands of Filipinos who would lose their means of mobility because of this suspension. We are now in the middle of a transportation crisis and we should really move quickly to solve this," Sarmiento said.

The panel chair said

the "carnageddon" on SLEX must also be addressed as the ongoing Skyway construction that led to the closure of some portions of the highway could last until the latter part of 2020.

The House panel would also ask concerned government agencies to present their traffic management plan in the light of the LRT-2 suspension and the SLEX repair.

"The transportation committee doesn't want to be stuck in the endless blame game that led to this traffic mess. Rather we want to get the solutions right away so that we can quickly make our recommendations on how we can ease the burden of our people," Sarmiento said.

He cited the need to address the transportation crisis because the traffic problem is expected to get even worse with the onset of the holiday season.

"We are now in the middle of a serious crisis and we must all work together to get out of this situation. I just hope that this time, our transport sector including our public utility operators can truly understand the gravity of our problem and take the actions necessary to get us out of this situation," Sarmiento said. Panda died of heart attack

Beijing-A giant panda whose sudden death in Thailand sparked outrage in China last month died from a heart attack, according to a Chinese government agency.

China dispatched a team of experts to Thailand after 19-year-old Chuang Chuang died at the Chiang Mai Zoo on September 16. Pandas can live up to 30 years in captivity.

The panda had been living in an air-conditioned enclosure with female Lin Hui.

The pair were on loan from the southwestern Chinese city of Chengdu as part of Beijing's so-called "panda diplomacy" and were supposed to be returned in 2023.

Chuang Chuang's demise became a trending topic on China's Weibo, a popular social media platform where people discussed the

"suspicious circumstances" of his death.

Users criticized the zoo for giving him mature bamboo—usually harder and used to make furniture—as food, though it remained unclear if the photos shared were actually of Chuang Chuang.

After an autopsy, a joint group of Thai and Chinese experts "unanimously" concluded that there was no trauma on the panda's body and no foreign body in his trachea, China's National Forestry and Grassland Administration said on its Weibo account on Tuesday. The cause of death was "an acute attack of chronic heart failure" resulting in a lack of oxygen, it said.

Chiang Mai zoo director Wutthichai Muangmun told reporters at the time that before his death, Chuang Chuang was doing what he liked best—eating bamboo.

ORDER

This verified petition, dated 05 July 2018, filed by the petitioners, through counsel, prays that after due notice, publication and hearing, judgment be rendered for the issuance of a decree of adoption declaring the minor Ashley Nicole Sangalang Morgan as the legitimate child of the petitioners Marilyn Sangalang Morgan, a Filipino citizen; and Cleon Horten Morgan, an American citizen.

On 29 April 2019, the Court found that the petition prayed for a change of the minor's name. Thus, the court directed the petitioners to amend the petition in conformity with Section 10 of A.M. No. 02-6-02-SC to contain the full name by which the child is to be known. Further, petitioners were likewise directed to furnish the Office of the Solicitor General with a copy of the amended petition together with its annexes and to furnish this Court a copy of such compliance and amended petition within five (5) days from receipt of this Order pursuant to Section 12 last paragraph of the same law.

On 27 May 2019, the petition has not yet been amended to the effect that the registered name of the child and the full name by which the child is to be known be contained in the title or caption of the case.¹ Hence, the court reiterated its order dated 29 April 2019.

On 14 June 2019, petitioners, through counsel, filed an amended Petition dated 11 June 2019, to include the full name "Ashley Nicole Sangalang Morgan" by which the minor is to be known. Thus, the Amended Petition attached thereto is **ADMITTED**. The original petition is hereby amended accordingly.

The registered name of the adoptee Ashley Nicole tia Nacario as appearing in the birth certificate shall be known as **ASHLEY NICOLE SANGALANG MORGAN** after the petition is granted.

On 20 August 2019, finding the petition to be sufficient in form and substance, the case was set for hearing on 8 October 2019 at 8:30 o'clock in the morning before this Court sitting at the Government Center Building, Capitol Site, Trece Martires City, Cavite. A copy of the order was directed to be published at least once a week for three (3) consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation within the Province of Cavite.

Considering however that there is no sufficient time between the date the Order for publication is raffled and the hearing on 8 October 2019, in the interest of justice, let this case be reset for initial hearing on 2 March 2020 and 6 April 2020 both at 8:30 o'clock in the morning, to be held at the Government Center Building Capitol Site, Trece Martires City, Cavite on which date, time and place any interested person may appear to show cause, if he/she has any, why this petition should not be granted.²

Let a copy of this Order be published at least once a week for three (3) consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation within the Province of Cavite and have copies hereof be furnished the Department of Social Welfare and Development, Office of the Solicitor General, Office of the Prosecutor of Cavite, Philippine Statistics Authority, petitioners and their counsel.

The parties are hereby directed to coordinate with the Clerk of Court for the raffling of the publication.

Suicides kill more people than natural calamities

ANKARA -- Suicides due to mental disorders take more lives every year than terrorism or natural calamities.

According to a World Health Organization (WHO) report, nearly 800,000 people commit suicide every year due to psychological reasons.

On eve of the World Mental Health Day on Oct 10, a report prepared by the WHO stated that around 350 million people are suffering from depression, and 264 million people face anxiety disorder.

The 36-member Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), an intergovernmental economic organization, says that mental disorders are affecting 20% of global working population. It apprehends that if left unchecked, the psychological ailments will cost the global economy nearly USD16 trillion by 2030.

The WHO -- a specialized agency of the UN, concerned with international public health, has documented that 450 million people across the world are affected by mental disorders.

It has further documented that in a 10-year period, from 2005-2015, the prevalence of psychological ailments has increased by 16% due to conflicts and migration. At least one in every nine people, who live in a conflict area, has reported mental illness.

The report said at

least 79% of suicides were reported from low and middle-income countries. It further revealed that 10-20% of children and adolescent are affected with some psychological disorder. At least 50% of those mentally challenged are affected by this disease before the age of 14.

More alarming is that over 40% of countries do not have mental health care policies. Another 30% do not possess mental health care program and 25% of countries do not have mental health care regulations.

As many as 23 million people have reported schizophrenia and 60 million people bipolar disease. The number of dementia patients has also increased to 50 million.

According to WHO, two in every three people do not come for treatment, fearing exclusion from society.

In 2018, 76%-85% of people from low and middle-income groups affected by psychological disorders could not receive treatment. In high-income countries, 35%-50% of people did not receive treatment.

According to the World Bank's data, psychological diseases and substance use disorder are affecting 10% of the working population in the world. But the OECD has put this figure at 20%. (Anadolu)

120K in Western Pacific get infected with HIV each year: WHO

MANILA -- The World Health Organization (WHO) said on Thursday that an estimated 120,000 people in the Western Pacific region are still being infected with HIV each year, with a significant increase in new infections in the Philippines.

WHO said current HIV prevention efforts in the region focus on key populations, such as men who have sex with men, people who inject drugs and sex workers.

"These efforts include the use of antiretrovirals as pre-exposure prophylaxis, community-based HIV testing and partner notification, and transitioning to newer and more effective drug regimens," WHO said in a statement.

The good news is that more and more HIV patients in the region have access to HIV treatment, the United Nations health agency added.

WHO noted "progress" in access to HIV treatment in the region, which has grown from 34 percent in 2014 to 59 percent in 2018, with 1.11 million of an estimated 1.9 million people living with HIV on antiretroviral treatment.

WHO added that hepatitis remains "a key challenge" for the region, with an estimated 115 million people with chronic hepatitis B infection and 14 million with chronic hepatitis C

infection.

Currently, WHO said only 17 percent are diagnosed and a mere 3 percent are receiving treatment.

Chronic hepatitis B and C are the most common causes of liver cirrhosis and liver cancer, according to WHO.

At the 17th session of the WHO Regional Committee for the Western Pacific being held in Manila since Monday, health leaders agreed to develop a nine-year action plan to eradicate hepatitis.

"Delegates emphasized the need to overcome barriers to testing and treatment, since too few people are aware they are infected with hepatitis, or receive the medications to treat it," WHO added.

WHO said it will continue working with countries, experts and partners to develop a hepatitis regional action plan for 2021 to 2030.

Responding to rising rates of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) in some countries, delegates also welcomed support from WHO to estimate the number of people infected, intensify surveillance and update treatment guidelines.

WHO said stigma, discrimination and inequitable access to services, particularly among key populations, still pose challenges in the region for those with HIV, hepatitis and STIs. (Xinhua)

Cauayan initiates national 'Smart City' drive with PLDT

Cauayan City, Isabela-To boost smart city initiatives, Mayor Bernard Faustino M. Dy recently signed a memorandum of agreement with PLDT and Smart for the upgrade of their fixed and mobile network services to transform Cauayan into a fully fiberized and Smart LTE-powered city that provides efficient digital services to its constituents.

Dy said, the core of a smart city is using technology to eventually improve the lives of the people. "These simple things-as simple as getting information through technology-really change the lives of people and improve them in ways that we cannot imagine," Dy stressed.

To many, the term 'smart city' induces a first world, highly urbanized metropolis with driverless cars on the streets. But Cauayan's vision of a smart city for its citizens, particularly for its farmers, is more down-to-earth.

The northern Luzon city of Cauayan in Isabela, one of the country's premier agro-industrial hubs, is also one of the Philippines' first smart cities. It has its own citizen app, a unified electronic payment system across the town, and free Wi-Fi in its barangays to help the local government deliver its services to citizens more efficiently.

"Smart cities can be as complex as having sensors in every street, in every aspect of the city. It can be as complicated and futuristic as having laws and ordinances passed to allow driverless, unmanned vehicles on the streets. But it can also be as simple as informing the farmers if it's going to rain or not," said Cauayan City Mayor Bernard Dy, who has been at the forefront of Cauayan's journey toward being a smart city for the past years.

"We have really embraced technology and used it to make our citizens' lives more convenient," Dy added

"For example, if the farmers know that it is going to rain, then they won't leave their produce out to dry and risk spoiling them."

Meanwhile, PLDT chair Manuel V. Pangilinan said, "We are happy to join hands with the Cauayan City government in ushering in this new age of smart cities, and supporting their leaders' efforts to advance the digital transformation of their communities.

"Through partnerships like this, we are helping accelerate the country's march into its digital future, one Smart City at a time," he added.

Cauayan City has been cited by the Department of Science and Technology for its smart city initiatives, particularly for using ICT-based technologies in deliering government services.

"Technology plays a crucial role in making public services more accessible and convenient. With fast and reliable fixed and mobile connecivity in the city, we are helping Cauayan City Mayor Bernard Dy and his government to better service their citizens in a quick, efficient, and effective manner," said PLDT chief revenue officer and Smart President Alfredo S. Panlilio.

PLDT is currently rolling out as fiber powered fixed broadband network across Cauayan to serve customers with internet service speeds of up to 1Gbps. Meanwhile, Smart is upgrading its existing cell sites across the city to provide 4G or Long-Term Evolution (LTE) mobile data services Smart is also set to rollout additional LTE sites in Cauayan in the coming months.

Dy recalled how Cauayan's journey toward being a smart city began in 2015.

"The Department of Science and Technology wanted to embark on a bigger and grander

mission to transform our country into a smarter nation. At the time, it was only Cauayan City that really embraced this smart city, initiative," Dy said.

Sancho Maborang, DOST regional director for Region 2, said that Cagayan Valley may be the Philippines' Silicon Valley. "Now, with PLDT and Smart supporting this smart city project, we will be able to expedite the realization of Cauayan City's ambitions," Maborang said speaking during the recent MoA signing ceremonies attended by PLDT-Smart executive and local government officials.

"When we talk about smart cities, a lot of people think it's a highly urbanized city. It's a metropolitan city, a cosmopolitan city, a First World city. But it could be so ironic to find a smart city in a rural setting," Dy said. "This has challenged us to show the country that if we can do it in Cauayan, in the rural setting, there is no reason for other cities not to do it."

More than transforming their own city, Cauayan is looking at inspiring a national movement. "We have also embarked on a mission to create more cities in the Philippines that follow this smart and sustainable framework," said Dy.

And with national legislation to support smart cities already underway, Dy is even more hopeful. "This is our way of showing the rest of the world that even if we are a third world country, once we embrace technology, we will be at par with the rest of the world," he said.

PLDT and Smart also announced that it has struck an agreement with Isabela State University to conduct research in developing relevant digital services utilizing cutting-edge technologies. PLDT-Smart will deploy the country's first XGS-PON, or symmetrical 10Gbps Fixed Internet technology in ISU to help its faculty

Climate activists begin protest

Sydney- Dozens of protesters were arrested across Australia and New Zealand on Monday as Extinction Rebellion activists kicked off a fortnight of global civil disobedience demanding governments take urgent action on climate change.

Hundreds joined a sit-in on busy inner Sydney road, which police brought to an end by dragging away demonstrators. Thirty people were later charged. A small group of activists also locked themselves to a bridge in Brisbane, where police said they arrested and charged seven people.

Meanwhile, demonstrators shut down part of Wellington, New Zealand's capital, by chaining themselves to a bright pink car. Police said 30 people were arrested later in the day of protest, but none were charged.

They were the start of planned disruptions in 60 cities around the world over the next two weeks by Extinction Rebellion, which is warning of a looming environmental "apocalypse".

Thousands are expected to join other events this week in Australia, including a bee die-off enactment, a nude parade and a funeral procession for the planet.

"We have tried petitions, lobbying, and marches, and now time is running out," Australian activist Jane Morton said.

"We have no choice but to rebel until our government declares a climate and ecological emergency and takes the action that is required to save us."

Australia is ruled by a conservative government that has resisted taking comprehensive action to tackle climate change while backing lucrative coal

exports.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison last month snubbed a United Nations climate summit after he was not invited to speak because of his lack of new climate announcements.

"Our governments are lying to us about the state of the climate and ecological emergency," Melbourne-based climate activist Christine Canti told AFP.

"I have got four small young children and I want to be able to look them in the eye and tell them when I found out the extent and the severity of the crisis... I did absolutely everything within my power to be able to try and reverse that."

Extinction Rebellion's tactics in Australia have prompted senior conservative politicians to call for protesters' welfare payments to be cut and for public denunciations.

"People should take these names and the photos of these people and distribute them as far and wide as they can so that we shame these people," Australian Home Affairs Minister Peter Dutton said on radio last week.

"Shame them because of the actions they have committed and because they're acting outside of the law and against community standards. Let their families know what you think of their behaviour."

In the northern Australian state of Queensland, home to huge coal mines and Dutton's electorate, harsher penalties are being considered in response to the regular disruption of peak-hour traffic.

Sydney assistant police commissioner Mick Willing accused protesters of putting themselves and others at risk, warning similarly disruptive protests

in the future would "not be tolerated".

Extinction Rebellion has scheduled non-violent protests chiefly in Europe, North America and Australia over the next fortnight.

Events will also be held in India, Buenos Aires, and Cape Town.

An "opening ceremony" Sunday evening attracted hundreds of people to central London, where plans are in place to shut down key sites including Westminster and Lambeth bridges, in addition to protests outside key government departments.

Hundreds of activists barricaded themselves inside a Paris shopping centre for hours over the weekend, unfurling banners with slogans such as "Burn capitalism, not petrol" above restaurants and fashion boutiques.

In Delhi, one of the world's most polluted cities, dozens of protesters staged another preliminary event on Sunday by holding a "die-in" on a road in the heart of India's capital.

Holding up hands covered in red paint and signs such as "There is no planet B", they called on the Indian government to act to tackle climate change.

"I don't know if I will have a future or not," Vansha Jain, 17, told AFP.

Extinction Rebellion was established last year in Britain by academics and has become one of the world's fastest-growing environmental movements.

Campaigners want governments to declare a climate and ecological emergency, reduce greenhouse gas emissions to zero by 2025, halt biodiversity loss and be led by new "citizens' assemblies" on climate and ecological justice.
