## DA to study rice variety matched with PH consumers' preference

MANILA — The Department of Agriculture (DA) is set to conduct a study on the palay (unhusked rice) varieties that will match consumers' preferences.

This came after Agriculture Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel Jr. ordered the DA to address the reported low farmgate prices of wet palay in some areas due to the shifting preference of the Filipino market.

In a press briefing Monday, DA spokesperson Assistant Secretary Arnel de Mesa said they will include the quality of imported rice varieties in the study, as it gains a growing demand in the Philippines.

“Pag-aralan mabuti kung paano. Una kung ano iyong pinakamagandang variety na itanim talaga to match iyong mga (We need to carefully study the way. First, on what is

the best variety to be planted to match the quality,” he said.

De Mesa cited some of the top inbred rice varieties in Vietnam, which both possess high-yielding and good eating qualities, including OM18, OM5451, and Dai Thom 8 (DT8).

The agriculture official explained that the Philippines also has good-eating quality rice varieties, but not relatively high-yield-

ing, and vice versa.

“Iyong mga malalakas mag-aní pero hindi masyadong maganda iyong eating-quality, iyong 222 atsaka iyong RC10. Iyong 222, 35 percent ang tinaniman iyan. So iyong iyong pinakamarami (There are those which are high yielding but the eating quality is not that good, these are the 222 and RC10. The 222 has secured 35 percent of the total planting area. So that’s

## PHLPost reiterates official requirements for postal ID applications

MANILA — The Philippine Postal Corporation (PHLPost) has issued a new circular reminding the public and its personnel of the official requirements for Postal ID applications to ensure uniformity in processing and prevent confusion among clients.

In a news release on Tuesday, Acting Postmaster General and Chief Executive Officer Maximo Sta. Maria III stressed that the directive, outlined under PHLPost Circular 25-48 dated March 20, 2025, seeks to streamline procedures across all post offices nation-wide.

Under the guidelines, all new Postal ID applicants must personally appear and submit one duly accomplished application form, written in bold letters using black or blue ink.

MANILA — Transportation Secretary Vince Dizon called for international private sector partners for the country's North-South Commuter Railway (NSCR) during a market sounding activity in Singapore on Monday.

During the event, Dizon said the Philippines is shifting away from a car-centric approach as part of President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr.'s vision of a commuter-centric transport system.

“The President said: We have to give the Filipino people the public transport that

they not only need, but what they deserve. That speaks to where our President's heart is—that he understands the importance of mobility, the daily commute. He feels our people's pain on a daily basis,” he said.

He said the Philippines is capable of building a public transportation model similar to other progressive countries with the help of other countries and multilateral partners such as the Asian Development Bank (ADB) and InfraAsia.

“It will change the way families enjoy

Following the study on rice varieties, Tiu Laurel ordered the DA to educate farmers on planting high-yielding yet good-eating quality palay varieties. The agency earlier said it targets to implement the measure in the next cropping season.

#### Increasing farmgate prices

De Mesa, meanwhile, reported that farmgate prices began increasing as the onset of harvest season nears alongside the impending rice import ban in September.

"May nakita rin ako na datos na dati mayroong 6 out of the 13 producing regions yung mayroong recorded na pagtaas, ngayon parang nadadagdagan pa 'yung mga areas na nagre-report ng increases ng presyo ng palay (I saw a data that 6 out of 13 producing regions have recorded an increase, now it seems like more areas are reporting this upward trend in farmgate price of palay)," he said.

The National Food Authority (NFA), meanwhile, said that the average traders' price in the farmgate is set at PHP14.3 per kg. of wet palay and PHP17.07 per kg. for clean and dry, as of Aug. 12.

This is higher than the PHP13 per kg. palay production cost according to the DA, but is still lower than the NFA's buying price set at PHP17 per kg. for wet palay and PHP23 per kg. for dry palay under the flexible Price Range Scheme (PRICERS).

The highest traders' price for wet palay, meanwhile, was reported in Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) at PHP17.67 per kg.; followed by Central Mindanao at PHP16.25 per kg.; and Northern Mindanao at PHP16.13 per kg.

Other regions surpassing the PHP13 per kg. production cost include the Ilocos region, Western, Central, and Eastern Visayas, as well as Western and Southern Mindanao.

De Mesa maintained optimism that more areas will soon report increasing farmgate prices, as import arriv-

"After building the wall, the dumped soil is no longer removed. That's what causes flooding in Laguna. It's the same problem all over the country. We keep building walls along rivers, and contractors just keep dumping soil into them," Ang explained.

To address this, Ang and Aragones committed to finalize a memorandum of agreement (MOA) covering river dredging and bed expansion which seeks to provide flood protection benefits for the next 50 years.

The project will be carried out at no cost to either the national or provincial government and without tax credits or incentives to the corporation.

"We will sign a MOA with Governor Sol Aragones to widen all the rivers in Laguna. Our goal is to provide a long-term solution to the province's flooding problem for the next 50 years. All narrow rivers will be widened by 30 percent of their current

their time with each other, their productivity. It will change the daily lives of every Filipino who wakes up every morning and goes to work, every student who goes to school, every senior citizen who had to endure a dilapidated public transport," he said.

To help fulfill Marcos' vision, he said the government has tapped the assistance of the private sector by privatizing operations and maintenance (O&M) of the NSCR project under a Public-Private Partnership (PPP) arrangement.

The NSCR is targeted to be fully operational by 2032, with partial operations from Valenzuela to Malolos, Bulacan set in December 2027, while the Malolos to Clark International Airport (CRK) segment is expected to be operational by October 2028.

Once completed, the 147-km. railway system is expected to transport 750,000 passengers daily and cut travel time for communities in the National Capital Region (NCR), Bulacan, Pampanga, and Calamba, Laguna. (PNA)

Hakab 'Ta is part of the National Breastfeeding Awareness Month activities and follows a long-running tradition of simultaneous breastfeeding events and community promotions that encourage exclusive breastfeeding, strengthen mother-baby bonding, and raise public awareness about the health and nutritional benefits of breastmilk. These gatherings aim to create visible community support for breastfeeding and to remind the public that breastfeeding is the best start for infants.

The activity featured a lecture on breastfeeding by Dr. Jindra Tetangco of the Philippine Pediatric Society - Southern Tagalog Chapter. She delivered an informative and encouraging lecture covering breastfeeding techniques, proper latch, common concerns (sore nipples, low milk supply), and how family members can support a breastfeeding mother. Participating mothers took part in demonstrations and had the opportunity for one-on-one consultations with health staff. To close the program, Dr. Laura Maria Soledad A. Aguinaldo, GEAMH Breastfeeding Coordinator, delivered an inspiring message, commending the mothers for their commitment to giving their children the best start in life and encouraging them to continue breastfeeding with the support of their families and community. qualified for other loans, such as the Multipurpose Loan, Calamity Loan and the Health and Education Loan Program (HELP).

## Rizal science week showcases local solutions to CALABARZON's challenges

Secretary Renato U. Solidum Jr. said on Thursday that 2025 Regional Science, Technology, and Innovation Week (RSTW) celebration is a good opportunity for the public to learn the several local solutions offered by the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) to solve Rizal's existing challenges.

Among the points Secretary Solidum mentioned was the partnership with the Rizal Provincial Government, which highlighted efforts to combat malnutrition in Antipolo's public schools through locally developed nutrition and food processing technologies.

"Kamakailan nga lang po ay kasama natin si Governor (Rebecca) Ynares sa paglulunsad ng Expanded School-Based Feeding Program (SBFP) na ginanap din dito sa Antipolo," said Solidum.

Solidum explained that this program will provide hot and nutritious meals for 120 days and milk for 15 days. Among these initiatives are the development of nutritious food products, the promotion of food processing and packaging technologies to preserve quality, safety, and nutrition, and the conduct of in-depth research to determine the effects of feeding interventions.

The SBFP is a program of the Department of Education in the Philippines aimed at addressing under-nutrition and hunger among public school learners. It is implemented in collaboration with other government agencies, including the



DOST, for food technology support.

Solidum also shared DOST programs that can help modernize Rizal's traditional industries — such as Angono's arts and crafts and Taytay's garment sector — by introducing technology upgrades to boost competitiveness.

"Through enterprise development programs like SETUP (Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program) and CEST (Community Empowerment through Science and Technology), we help MSMEs improve product quality, access training, and discover and uplift indigenous and grassroots innovations in crafts and the circular economy. In 2024, we supported 17 impactful initiatives across the region, with a total investment of over ₱6 million," said Sec. Solidum.

He also underscored the important roles of Taytay, Rizal in DOST's smart city roadmap initiative and how digital innovation could improve public services and infrastructure.

"Actually, we are working with Taytay to develop smart city roadmaps aligned with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals. Local government units are

being assessed and recognized for their efforts to bridge the digital divide," said Sec. Solidum.

Sec. Solidum also mentioned that DOST scholars based in Rizal are being trained not only for careers in science but also to become entrepreneurs driving local innovation.

"Our scholarships are an investment in future scientists, complemented by programs such as the Scholars' Technopreneurship Training (STTP) and the 21st Century Learning Environment Model (CLEM), all aimed at cultivating young minds to be future-ready," said Sec. Solidum.

### DOST pushes Integrated Flood Plan

Meanwhile, Sec. Solidum emphasized that events like the RSTW, along with other DOST activities nationwide, highlight Disaster and Climate Resilience as a key component in building smart and sustainable communities.

"As you know, DOST is a science and research-based organization. So, when it comes to flood control, what needs to be done is to develop an integrated flood management system for each river basin or sub-river basin. The

## TESDA skills framework to boost semiconductor, electronics industries

MANILA — The Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA) on Tuesday launched the Philippine Skills Framework (PSF) seen to boost the semiconductor and electronics industries.

The launching was done in partnership with the Industry TVET (technical and vocational education and training) Board for Semiconductor and Electronics and its convener, the Semiconductor and Electronics Industries in the Philippines Foundation, Inc. (SEIPI).

According to TESDA, the PSF aligns workforce develop-

ment strategies with global industry standards, and provides a comprehensive reference for job roles, skills requirements, and industry-aligned training programs.

It aims to equip Filipino talents with the competencies needed to excel in the rapidly evolving semiconductor sector, which is among nation's top export drivers, TESDA added.

"By defining clear career pathways, the PSF empowers workers to upskill and reskill while enabling enterprises to thrive with a future-ready workforce," TESDA Secretary Francisco Benitez

was quoted as saying in a news release on Tuesday.

SEIPI president Daniel Lachica, on the other hand, said the PSF "is a shared commitment to nurture Filipino talent and drive the industry forward."

TESDA said the PSF is expected to strengthen the country's global competitiveness, attract investments, and create more quality jobs for Filipinos.

About 300 representatives from government agencies, industry partners, and international stakeholders attended the PSF launch at the TESDA central office in Taguig City. (PNA)

amount of rain varies over time, especially with climate change," he said, noting that excessive rainfall can cause flooding, while low rainfall can lead to drought.

He explained that addressing flooding requires considering its different types. "As areas urbanize and more surfaces are covered with concrete or asphalt, less water seeps into the soil, and more flows on the surface. Consequently, the volume of water needing drainage increases over time. Drainage systems must adapt to this change," said Sec. Solidum.

To manage these risks, mapping river systems and infrastructure using Geographic Information Systems (GIS) is crucial. "On DOST's side, we have launched the Spatial Analytics and Technology Solutions Program to digitize all data, enabling comprehensive planning efforts at the local level.

Through the Smart and Sustainable Communities Program, we offer technologies to help local governments plan effectively," Sec. Solidum said.

The 2025 RSTW celebration in CALABARZON runs from August 14–16 at the Ynares Event Center in Antipolo City, Rizal. It features interactive exhibits from various DOST agencies and partner institutions, most of which showcased products and results of research and development (R&D) programs, initiatives, and other scientific services.

The one-month payment moratorium applies to Pag-IBIG housing loan borrowers or buyers whose properties or workplaces were located in areas under state of calamity following the onslaught of tropical storms Crising, Dante,

or of the City of Santa Rosa, Laguna.

## DTI to e-commerce platforms: Remove illegal vapes or face penalties

MANILA – Online shops selling illegal vape products have been ordered to remove these from their platforms otherwise, their officials will be imprisoned for at least two years or penalized with at least PHP2 million.

During the Bagong Pilipinas Ngayon program on Tuesday, Department of Trade and Industry Director Eryl Royce Nagtalon, officer-in-charge of DTI's E-commerce Bureau, said the move to remove all listings of illegal vaporized nicotine and non-nicotine products is being made to ensure consumer's safety and for the government to collect proper taxes.

He said selling unregistered vape products violates the Consumer Act of the Philippines, the Vape Law, and the rules and regulations of the Department of Health (DOH), which has been fighting to address smoking, and the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR).

Nagtalon said online selling platforms have been properly informed of the government's directive to remove all illegal listings in their shops, and an inter-agency monitoring for compliance is ongoing.

"Ongoing po ang ating monitoring niyan. Mayroon po tayong spot checking, mayroon po tayong mga teams na ready po diyan. And of course, if ever man

na sa kasamaang-palad is hindi po sila maka-comply, naka-ready naman ang ating mga legal remedies under the Consumer Act, the Internet Transactions Act and other trade, industry laws. (There is ongoing monitoring. We conduct spot checking and have teams for this. If they will still not comply, we are ready with the legal remedies under the Consumer Act, the Internet Transactions Act, and other trade, (and) industry law," he said.

Nagtalon said the government, under the Internet Transactions Act, has a database of online businesses, so even if the online sellers change sites, the government would still be able to track them.

Lawyer Frediswenda Benas, DTI's E-commerce Enforcement and Compliance Division chief, during the same briefing, said around 92,000 listings of ille-

gal vape products have been monitored by DTI's Office for the Special Mandate on Vaporized Nicotine and Non-Nicotine Products, their Devices, and Novel Tobacco Products (OSMV) in the past two years.

"Sa loob po ng dalawang taon marami na po tayong nahulihan na nagbibenta po ng illicit vape products, whether online or physical establishments po. (In the past two years, we have caught many people selling illicit vape products, whether online or in physical establishments)," she said.

Benas said online platforms are deemed solidary liable for illegal items being sold through their sites, and their officials may be slapped with prison time of at least two years and fines of at least PHP2 million to as much as six years and PHP5 million. (PNA)
