CALABARZON farmers to adopt tech for soil, nitrogen analysis

TRECE MARTIRES CITY, Cavite (PIA) – Farmers in the CALABARZON region will soon adopt modern technology to revolutionize local agricultural practices and improve local rice production.

Last September 15 to 19, around 25 rice farmers from the provinces of Batangas and Cavite joined DA ATI's training on Integrated Nutrient and Water Management (INWM).

Launched by the

Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Training Institute (DA ATI) in CALABARZON, the three-day training included lectures and practical exercises on using modern diagnostic tools for nutrient and water management such as the MOET App, Leaf Color Chart (LCC), and Alternate Wetting and Drying (AWD).

Developed by the Philippine Rice Research Institute (PhilRice), the MOET App is a low-cost alterna-

tive for diagnosing soil nutrient deficiencies in nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, sulfur, zinc, and copper.

Meanwhile, the Leaf Color Computing App (PhilRice LCC) captures leaf images and evaluates nitrogen needs of the rice plant. It can also generate recommendations in addressing nutrient needs of the plant in under a minute.

On the other hand, the Alternate Wetting and Drying (AWD) technology helps farmers



save water to reduce their irrigation water consumption in rice fields without decreas-

ing its yield.

Gov't measures help cushion impact of inflation

MANILA – Government measures have helped cushion the impact of inflation on the poorest Filipino families, Agriculture Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel Jr. said Tuesday.

This, after the Philippine Statistics Authority reported during the day that price deflation

persisted for the bottom 30 percent income households, at -0.2 percent in September 2025 from -0.6 percent in August.

Headline inflation, meanwhile, slightly quickened to 1.7 percent from 1.5 percent in August, due to the impact of weather disturbances on food sup-

ply.


Among others, food inflation surged to 19.4 percent from 10 percent in August due to higher vegetable prices.

In a statement, Tiu Laurel said the Department of Agriculture (DA) has taken measures to manage the supply and prices

of the country's main staples, including rice, sugar, and corn.

"We have ordered the importation of certain vegetables and fish to augment local supplies and keep prices stable," he said.

Earlier, the DA confirmed the importation of red and white onions, carrots, and broccoli to help stabilize prices following (Turn to p. 3)

Health group to LGUs: Secure flu vaccines for seniors

MANILA – Senior health advocates on Thursday called on local government units (LGUs) to protect high-risk groups like the elderly against influenza-like illnesses (ILIs), emphasizing that delayed vaccination could lead to severe and costly flu complications.

This, after the Quezon City government reported that the ILIs have surpassed the epidemic threshold, with 152 cases reported from Aug. 31 to Sept. 13.

The Private Hospitals Association of the Philippines, Inc. (PHAPI) also reported a 10-percent increase in patient admissions, noting that hospitals are “mostly full” as the rainy season intensifies.

Bayan Bakuna lead convenor Mikaella Jeleene Salinas Asoy said vaccine allocations from the national government remain uncertain.

“LGUs should immediately coordinate with

the DOH (Department of Health) for available allocations or, if none are provided, procure vaccines locally and roll out vaccination drives before cases surge further,” she said in a statement.

According to health experts, seniors face the highest risk of severe flu complications, including pneumonia and heart attacks.

Hospitalization costs for such can range from PHP10,000 to PHP30,000

Household transmission rates can reach 13 to 32 percent, with flu spreading aggressively among school-age children. Older persons who live with or help care for grandchildren who may unknowingly bring the virus home become at a greater risk.

“The reported spike in cases highlights the urgent need for preventive measures,” Asoy said.

“Vaccination remains the most proven, cost-effective way to protect the elderly

population,” she added.

She urged families to accompany their elderly loved ones to barangay health centers and inquire about vaccine availability.

She noted that such community demand can help LGUs prioritize vaccination programs and ensure that seniors are protected from vaccine-preventable diseases.

Bayan Bakuna is a grassroots senior citi-

zens’ organization that aims to promote the welfare of the elderly through productive legislative collaborations.

It developed a position paper advocating for the implementation of Republic Act 9994, also known as the Expanded Senior Citizens Act, including advocacy for free influenza and pneumococcal vaccines for indigent senior citizens. (PNA)

Provincial Development Council Holds 2nd Quarter Full Council Meeting

The Provincial Development Council (PDC) of Cavite convened its 2nd Quarter Full Council Meeting on September 18, 2025, at the New Provincial Government Center, underscoring its commitment to strategic and inclusive development planning for the province.

The session, facilitated by the Office of the Provincial Planning and Development Coordinator (OPPDC), brought together local chief executives, provincial officials, and key stakeholders to review ongoing initiatives and set the direction for upcoming programs.

Governor Francisco Gabriel D. Remulla presided over the meeting, emphasizing the provincial government's dedication to collaborative governance. In his message, he called for stronger synergy among all sectors to ensure the timely and effective implementation of development projects that directly address the needs of Caviteños.

Among the key agenda items were major infrastructure and development proposals, including the construction of a farm-to-market bridge, flood mitigation measures, and several infrastructure projects in Bacoor City. Other highlights included the proposed Silang Public Hospital, the farm-to-market road network plan, the realignment of the 2025 20% Development Fund, and the supplementary list of programs, projects, and activities for inclusion in the 2025 Annual Investment Program (AIP).

The Council also discussed long-term plans such as the Executive-Legislative Agenda (ELA) 2025–2028, the Provincial Development and Investment Program (PDIP) 2025–2028, the Updated Commodity Investment Plan 2024–2026, and the preparation of the 2026 AIP. Updates on the accomplishments of the Cavite Provincial Project Monitoring Committee (PPMC) and the reorganization of PDC's sectoral and functional committees were likewise presented.

Notable attendees included Bacoor City Mayor Strike Revilla, Silang Mayor Ted Carranza, and Ternate Mayor Lamberto Bambao, who actively engaged in the deliberations.

The meeting concluded with a renewed commitment among council members to push forward programs that advance inclusive growth and sustainable development across Cavite. The productive session reaffirmed the PDC's role as the province's central coordinating body for development planning, laying a firm groundwork for continued progress in the years ahead.

PGC Awards Hearing Aids to Children and Adults with Hearing Impairment

The Provincial Government of Cavite, through the OPG-Office of the Provincial Persons with Disability Affairs Officer (OPG-OPPDO), successfully held the dispensing and awarding of hearing aids last September 19, 2025, at the auditorium of Cavite Collaboration Center for Public Health in Trece Martires City.

A total of 66 beneficiaries, composed of 41 children and 25 adults with mild to severe hearing loss, received hearing aids during the activity. The children received assistance through a partnership with the Provincial Council for the Protection of Children. All recipients were selected based on the results of hearing tests conducted by the Manila Hearing Aid recently.--- OPIO

Cavite Holds Consultative Meeting on Rabies Prevention in Support of World Rabies Day

The Office of the Provincial Health Officer spearheaded a Consultative Meeting on Rabies Prevention and Control Program in celebration of World Rabies Day recently, at the Cavite Collaboration Center for Public Health in Trece Martires City.

The activity gathered doctors and nurses from various Animal Bite Treatment Centers (ABTCs) in Cavite, alongside health professionals, to strengthen the province's response against rabies.

Dr. Nelson C. Soriano, Provincial Health Officer I, delivered the welcome remarks emphasizing Cavite's continuing efforts to eliminate rabies. Updates on human rabies cases in the province were presented by Ms. Charlene E. Rosanes, Provincial Rabies Prevention and Control Program (RPCP) Coordinator, followed by an in-depth discussion on DOH Interim Guidelines (DM No. 2025-0368) regarding the administration of suspected and confirmed counterfeit anti-rabies vaccines, led by Mr. Jomell V. Mojica, Regional RPCP Coordinator of DOH-CHD IV-A.

In addition, Ms. Janissa Therese G. Gutierrez of the FDA highlighted the risks of counterfeit medicines and the proper process of reporting such cases to ensure public safety.

The program aimed to raise awareness and enhance advocacy against rabies, support the global observance of World Rabies Day, and tackle critical issues related to the circulation of counterfeit vaccines.

The event concluded with an open forum and closing remarks from Dr. Armand J. Dotollo, Medical Officer III and Head of OPHO Infectious Cluster, underscoring Cavite's unified commitment to protect communities from rabies and safeguard the integrity of vaccines provided to the public.--- OPIO

the impact of recent weather disturbances.

DepEd Calabarzon strengthens child protection measures amid shortage of mental health professionals

But where does teasing end and bullying begin?

The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) defines bullying as 'a pattern of behaviour, rather than an isolated incident where children who usually come from a perceived higher social status or position of power and who are bigger, stronger, or perceived to be popular are the perpetrators.'

In his 2025 State of the Nation Address (SONA), President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. highlighted the growing number of students experiencing depression and bullying, with a promise to hire more school counselors and other mental health professionals to support the education sector.

"Maraming mag-aaral ang nakakaranas ng bullying o kaya ay nade-depress. Binabantayan din natin ang mental health ng ating kabataan. Magdagdag tayo ng mga school counselors na magsisilbing sanggunian at gabay nila," the President said.

The President's directive underscores the pressing issues faced by the Philippine education system. Data from the 2018 Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) revealed that the Philippines ranked close to the bottom for reading, mathematics, and science. On the other hand, it is among the countries with prevalent issues on school bullying.

This concern was reinforced in a 2024 discussion paper of the Second Congressional Commission on Education (EDCOM II), which described

the Philippines as the 'bullying capital of the world.' The report revealed that 63 percent of Grade 5 pupils reported experiencing various forms of bullying – ranging from harassment, exclusion by their peers, physical harm, and, in some instances, the subject of malicious rumors.

Similarly, a 2019 UNICEF report found that almost half of Filipino children aged 13 to 17 had experienced cyberviolence or online bullying.

Like other forms of abuse, online bullying has devastating effects on the emotional and physical well-being of youngsters who are vulnerable and can access the internet very easily, and are becoming targets of online violence.

The Department of Education (DepEd) CALABARZON is now facing a challenge that goes far beyond managing classes and improving lesson plans. It must ensure that every child under its care is safe from abuse – both online and in real life.

Data from DepEd CALABARZON revealed that around 16 cases of bullying were reported during the first quarter of School Year 2025-2026. Of these, 11 cases have al-

ready been resolved at the school-level, while the rest remain under evaluation by their respective Schools Division Offices.

Rochelle May Nisola, Focal Person for Learner Rights and Protection, explained that DepEd CALABARZON has put in place a mechanism to help schools properly report and document bullying cases.

"We have initiated a reporting mechanism for schools where they fill out forms to report the status of these cases: if they have already been resolved or referred to other agencies."

Compensating the shortage

However, DepEd acknowledges that the shortage of mental health professionals has worsened the situation with many students facing mental health concerns such as depression and bullying.

"Of course hindi enough [yung bilang ng guidance counselors] kasi mahirap mag-cater ng ilang bata na involved sa bullying cases. We cannot deny the shortage of registered guidance counselors dahil nasa data natin, maraming items pero kaunti 'yung naga-aaply dahil na rin sa demand,"

Lawmaker wants farmers prioritized amid rice import suspension

MANILA – A lawmaker from Manila on Tuesday expressed his strong support for President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr.'s Executive Order No. 93, which suspends the importation of regular milled and well-milled rice effective Sept. 1.

In a statement, Manila 1st District Rep. Ernesto Dionisio Jr. noted the negative effects resulting from oversupply of imported rice, which have diminished opportunities for local producers and leads to economic hardships in rural communities.

Nisola added.

In CALABARZON, registered guidance counselors are often assigned to more than one school in an effort for make up for the shortage of mental health professionals.

As of 2022, Education Secretary Juan Edgardo Angara reported that there are only 4,069 licensed guidance counselors in the country, a far cry to the more than 50,000 counselors needed to meet the recommended global ratio of one counselor for every 250 students.

This problem is even more pronounced in CALABARZON, where only about 50 licensed guidance counselors are tasked to serve over three million students across 6,000 schools.

In the meantime, registered and designated guidance counselors in the region continue to undergo training to

of the House of Representatives Committee on Ways and Means, issued the statement after Agriculture Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel Jr. revealed that the order has no specified end date and outlined plans to extend the import ban until the end of 2025, alongside studies for higher tariffs on rice imports.

The lawmaker said he is hoping that the discussion about the suspension of the rice importation would lead to the amendment of the Rice Tariffication Law (Republic Act

"We are providing continuous training for registered guidance counselors and for our designates, so they will have the knowledge on handling such child protection concerns."

DepEd clarified that these designates are well-versed in child protection policies and mental health program, including conducting risk assessment for students.

"This will help us identify students who have a history of suicidal attempts or abuse. Guidance designates are also very important in our mental health programs."

With the passage of Republic Act 12080, more commonly known as the Basic Education Mental Health and Well-Being Promotion Act, DepEd CALABARZON expects to hire more registered guidance counselors to better address cases of bullying and other child protection concerns in the region. (PB/PIA4A)

No. 11203) that will best protect and serve farmers.

"There is a pressing necessity to revise our policies, beginning with the Rice Tariffication Law, to ensure that our agricultural sector thrives and our farmers are not

sidelined by the overwhelming volume of imports," he said.

Dionisio believed that farmers should get more benefits even as Filipinos enjoy lower prices of rice in the market.

Bullpups roll to 5th straight win in UAAP basketball

MANILA – Clark Khobutin registered the first triple-double in the UAAP Season 88 junior basketball tournament Wednesday, leading National University Nazareth School to a 93-82 victory over Adamson University at the SM Mall of Asia Arena in Pasay.

He posted 17 points, 12 rebounds, 11 assists, three steals and one block as the Bullpups rolled to their fifth straight win.

Khobutin's triple-double performance was the tournament's fourth after UST's Andwele Cabañero delivered 20 points, 15 rebounds and 10 assists in a 105-71 victory over Ateneo de Manila University on Nov. 27, 2024.

"We still need to improve our defense. For us, it all starts with the defense. That's what we have to polish heading into the next game," said NUNS head coach Leo Pujante.

The score was tied at 23-all at the end of the first quarter before Khobutin, Mark Arzola, Nick Peña and Dean Tria joined hands to give NUNS a 60-40 lead at halftime.

Allison Jordan sank a triple and Vengs Veng-

co scored on a layup as the Baby Falcons cut the lead to 65-79, six minutes remaining in the third quarter.

But the Bullpups pulled away at 87-68, with Moussa Diakite scoring six straight points, four minutes left to play.

Diakite led NUNS with 20 points and rebounds followed by Arzola with 18 points, six assists, five steals and two rebounds. David Sabareza made 15 points, two steals and two rebounds while Peña had 10 points, four rebounds and three assists.

"Basketball is a team game, it shouldn't be just one person to win. Moussa (Diakite) still really needs a backup like him. Not only Clark, but all of them have to perform.

That's what I'm telling them, don't rely on Moussa," Pujante said.

Kieff Iledan had 24 points, 10 rebounds, three assists and two steals, while Fran Flores chipped in 14 points, eight rebounds, five assists, five steals and two blocks for Adamson, which placed third in the standings with a 3-2 record, behind defending champion University of the East and Far Eastern University-Diliman, who have identical 3-1 cards.

In the other game, Ateneo de Manila clobbered University of the Philippines Integrated School, 87-40, to secure its second win in five outings for sixth place.

The Fighting Maroons are winless after five games. (PNA)
