DSWD employs 3-phase approach to ensure IDPs' recovery from calamities

MANILA – The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) is employing a three-phase and rights-based approach to ensure that no internally displaced person (IDP) is left behind in "building back better" after the multiple calamities in recent weeks.

"Our country is disas-

ter-prone. The affected families are often suffering from profound disaster fatigue, characterized by exhaustion, despair and a diminished capacity to cope with ongoing adversity," Director Maria Isabel Lanada of the DSWD - Disaster Response Management Bureau (DRMB) said in a news release

on Tuesday.

She said the systematic and rights-based approach to responding to the needs of IDPs ensures that families are comprehensively supported toward recovery, especially for those affected by successive disasters, ranging from tropical storms to earthquakes.

MANILA – Department of Education (DepEd) Secretary Sonny Angara and Department of Science and Technology (DOST) Secretary Renato Solidum Jr. on Tuesday strengthened DepEd's partnership with the Philippine Institute of Volca-

nology and Seismology (Phivolcs) to ensure prompt and science-based disaster preparedness.

In a statement, Angara said the government's disaster response measures must be both swift and accurate.

Laguna hospitals placed on high alert as quake readiness protocol

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna (PIA) – Laguna's hospitals were placed on high alert after a series of powerful earthquakes that rocked different parts of the country left hundreds of residents injured and overwhelmed hospitals.

Governor Sol Aragones directed hospitals in Laguna to ensure their readiness in responding to medical needs in the event of an earthquake.

Former Health Undersecretary-now Laguna's health consultant Dr. Eric Tayag said that heightened alert in hos-

pitals is part of the earthquake preparedness plan and that hospitals will be on standby to accommodate and treat casualties should the earthquake occur.

"Sasabayan ito ng paghahanda sa mga ospital sa buong Laguna, kaya po kasama po namin dito si Doctor Odie Inoncillo. Dapat po maintindihan po ng lahat na bagaman naghahanda tayong lahat sa posibleng lindol ay hindi po ito dapat nating paghinayangan sapagkat ito ay makakatulong sa ating preparasyon," he added.



Tayag reminded the public to remain vigilant even when no earthquake occurs.

He added: "Kung hindi naman po mangyayari ay isa itong oportunidad para tayo po ay palaging

Phase 1 (meeting basic needs) approach is to respond to the basic rights of the IDPs to life, safety and subsistence. This includes providing food and water, ensuring safe shelter through camp management, and protecting the rights of vulnerable IDPs.

"In areas recently ravaged by the Davao

and Cebu earthquakes, interventions involved immediate deployment of pre-positioned family food packs (FFP) and ready-to-eat food (RTEF) to provide instant nutrition. Aside from food, the agency provided temporary shelter by setting up and operating safe, sanitary, and gender-sensitive evacuation centers in accordance with Camp Coordination and Camp Management and Internally Displaced Persons protection standards," she said.

To strengthen the initial response, the DSWD acquired mobile kitchens, mobile command centers (MCCs) and water tankers for potable water.

"Under the leadership of Secretary Rex Gatchalian, the DSWD embarked on continuous innovations, especially in disaster management. That is

why, aside from our FFPs and RTEF, we have mobile kitchens that provide hot meals to IDPs, as well as water tankers that are now operating in Cebu and Davao disaster operations," Lanada said.

The MCC, meanwhile, ensures uninterrupted communication with local government units and other government agencies, and are helpful when a calamity disrupts regular means of communication.

Lanada said the DSWD transitions to Phase 2 (early recovery efforts) when the food, water, safety, and shelter needs of the affected population are already met.

"The crucial step to a disaster operation is to start efforts at recovery. The DSWD helps in providing intervention to assist families toward achieving normalcy, and start that process of building

back better. The Department utilizes its Assistance to Individuals in Crisis Situation (AICS) and Emergency Cash Transfer (ECT) program to help affected families rebuild their lives," she said.

The ECT is a cash assistance specifically provided to those most affected by disasters and calamities, enabling them to purchase their most pressing post-disaster needs.

"By injecting monetary resources into the community through the cash assistance, the ECT not only benefits families but also speeds up the economic recovery of the community," Lanada said.

The third phase of DSWD's disaster operations focuses on helping restore the well-being and psychosocial health of the affected families.

"Calamities cause trauma. Beyond just ensuring food, shelter and water, the DSWD contributes to that important role of helping those affected cope with the mental strains of a calamity by providing psychosocial support services," she said.

"Genuine recovery needs to be holistic, addressing the intangible

aftermath of disaster. The psychological and emotional impact of losing one's livelihood, home, and sense of security -- typical after large incidents such as the recent tropical storms or the powerful Davao and Cebu earthquakes -- needs focused intervention," she added.

Currently, the DSWD is conducting psychosocial first aid, stress debriefing and play therapy for the IDPs of the magnitude 6.9 earthquake in northern Cebu on Sept. 30.

The same psychosocial activities were also provided in other disaster operations and will be replicated by the social workers for the Davao disaster operations.

"The mental health and psychosocial support services of the Department aim to help disaster-affected Filipinos achieve psychosocial resilience, which includes not only physical healing, but also complete emotional stability and social reintegration," the DSWD official said.

In all its disaster operations, Lanada said the three-phase approach is the DSWD's guide in responding to the needs of the disaster-affected families and individuals. (PNA)

from class suspensions to learning continuity, are science-based, not from fear," he said.

Angara said that following his visit in Cebu and Davao Oriental to assess the damage wrought by earthquakes, he understood more deeply how crucial accurate data and coordination are.

"Sa tulong ng Phivolcs, masisiguro nating ang bawat hakbang ng DepEd ay mabilis, ligtas, at may batayang siyentipiko (With the help of Phivolcs, we can ensure that every action of DepEd is swift, safe, and science-based)."

Under the strategic partnership, Phivolcs will provide training

programs to capacitate DepEd regional and field offices in building integrity assessment and earthquake response, using checklist-based procedures for automatic safety alerts.

In particular, the partnership aims to ensure that all schools near fault lines are "over-engineered" to withstand strong earthquakes.

The collaboration is expected to result in a faster and more coordinated emergency response.

DepEd also proposed the establishment of a DepEd Command Center with Phivolcs, which will serve as a monitoring hub for both early warning and disaster re-

"Here at Sta. Rosa's new site, [we want to reach] first things first the barangay and city, and through the branch we can cater to the local community and offer [them] proper products," he added.



ment "will closely monitor the implementation and impact of the safeguard measure on cement prices to prevent any unwarranted price adjustments and to ensure that the duties remain at levels necessary to address the serious injury suffered by the domestic industry."

"The DTI will regularly review the safeguard duty to adjust its scope and intensity

in response to market conditions. The Department will actively regulate the effects of safeguard tariffs to maintain a balanced environment where both local manufacturers and cement importers can adapt, compete, and thrive, particularly during periods of calamities or supply disruptions," Roque said. DOH Calabarzon strengthens mental health support for victims of disaster

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna (PIA) — In line with the observance of World Mental Health Day 2025, the Department of Health, Center for Health Development (DOH-CHD) CALABARZON has called for stronger collective action to ensure that mental health care remains a core part of disaster response, and recovery efforts.

With this year's theme 'Access to Services: Mental Health in Catastrophes and Emergencies,' the DOH highlights the urgent need to integrate Mental Health and Psychosocial Support Services (MHPSS) in all levels of disaster preparedness and response.

"Kapag may kalamidad, hindi lang pisikal na aspeto ng ating mga kababayan ang dapat tugunan. Kailangan din nating alagaan ang kanilang isip at dam-damin," said Geneva C. Calanog, RN, MPH, Nurse III and Outcome Manager for the Mental Health Program of DOH CALABARZON.

Calanog noted that the effects of disasters—such as earthquakes, typhoons, fires, and even the COVID-19 pandemic—extend beyond physical injuries and property damage, often leading to anxiety, grief, and post-traumatic stress.

The MHPSS framework provides a comprehensive set of services aimed at maintaining and improving mental well-being during emergencies. It includes psychological first aid, community-based interventions, referral systems for specialized care, and support for vulnerable groups such as chil-



dren, the elderly, persons with disabilities, and individuals with pre-existing mental health conditions.

"Ang MHPSS ay tulang na makatao, galang sa puso. Layunin nito na tulungan ang mga nagbibigay ng kalin-ga," Calanog emphasized. "Kapag matatag ang mga tagapagling-kod, mas matatag din ang komunidad."

Calanog encouraged the public to recognize that asking for help is not a sign of weakness but a step toward healing.

health workers and responders who, despite helping others, also experience stress and emotional exhaustion.

"Gusto rin naming mapangalagaan ang mental health ng mga naapektuhan na makabangon — hindi lamang sa pisikal na aspeto kundi maging sa emosyonal at sikolohikal," Calanog said. "Our goal is to turn victims into survivors."

Throughout September, DOH CALABARZON rolled out a series of MHPSS training activities across the region to enhance the capacity of local government units and community responders. These trainings aim to ensure that every community can provide timely and compassionate mental health care in times of crisis.

The initiative also seeks to promote "caring for the carers"—extending psychosocial support to

MANILA — The Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) will impose the safeguard duty amounting to PHP14 per 40-kg bag of cement, based on the recommendation of the Tariff Commission, for the next three years.

In a statement, DTI Secretary Cristina

Roque said safeguard duty on Ordinary Portland Cement Type 1 and Blended Cement will "level the playing field between domestic manufacturers and importers and is not expected to be passed on to consumers, as the safeguard duty applies solely to imported cement."

DTI to adopt safeguard duty recommendation for imported cement

She said the amount of the safeguard accounts for about 3 percent to 4 percent of prevailing retail prices.

"The imposition of the safeguard duty will be subjected to dynamic monitoring and review to ensure that prices remain stable and supply stays suffi-

cient to cover demand at any given time," the statement reads.

The statement clarified that "the excess cash bond paid by importers or the difference between the provisional and final duty assessed will be refunded once the corresponding Department Order is issued."

It said Roque "remains mindful of the recent earthquakes that have severely affected several areas across the country, underscoring the critical need for cement in the rehabilitation and reconstruction of impacted communities."

DOH caravan to bring mental health services to Calabarzon schools

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna (PIA) — The Department of Health – Center for Health Development CALABARZON (DOH CHD CALABARZON) will bring mental health education right at the doorsteps of schools to help the youth deal with their psychosocial issues.

Billed the “Katatagan Caravan,” the mental health service is aimed at strengthening mental health awareness and resilience among students and school personnel.

The caravan will visit 31 schools across 31 congressional districts in the region, bringing mental health education and psychosocial support directly to young people. The initiative aims to empower learners to seek help without stigma and to equip teachers and guidance counselors with skills to recognize and respond to mental health concerns.

“We want our youth to understand that seeking help is normal and that mental health is just as important as physical health,” said Geneva C. Calanog, Outcome Manager for the Mental Health Program of DOH CALABARZON.

The upcoming program is part of DOH CALABARZON’s continuing advocacy to promote Mental Health and Psychosocial Support Services (MHPSS) in schools. Through the caravan, participants will take part in interactive learning sessions,



mental health talks, and peer support activities that foster emotional resilience and empathy.

The initiative also aims to enhance the capacity of teachers, guidance counselors, school nurses, and medical officers through training on MHPSS, the Mental Health Gap Action Program (mhGAP), and peer support systems for youth. These will ensure that schools can provide timely and compassionate care to students who may be experiencing distress.

“Hindi lang community health care providers ang dapat marunong magbigay ng mental health support. Importante rin na ang mga nasa paaralan ay may sapat na kasanayan upang matulungan ang ating mga kabataan,” Calanog explained.

The DOH continues to work closely with the Department of Education (DepEd) to strengthen the region’s school-based mental health programs. Earlier this year, DepEd personnel joined the DOH in capacity-building activities at the National Center

for Mental Health, underscoring the strong partnership between the two agencies.

“We want mental health services to be inclusive, especially in underserved and hard-to-reach areas. Walang maiwan pagdating sa kalinga at serbisyo ng kalusugang pangkaisipan,” Calanog said.

The Katatagan Caravan reinforces this year’s World Mental Health Day theme, “Access to Services: Mental Health in Catastrophes and Emergencies,” by promoting the integration of mental health care into all aspects of community life, including education.

Through this initiative, the DOH CALABARZON envisions resilient, compassionate, and mentally

POC sees big fighting chance for Team PH in Asian Youth Games

MANILA — The head of the Philippine Olympic Committee (POC) said he believes that the 141-strong national contingent has a big fighting chance in the 3rd Asian Youth Games (AYG), set to be held in Manama, Bahrain from Oct. 22 to 31.

"Yes, this team has a strong fighting chance," POC president Abraham "Bambol" Tolentino said during the national team's photo shoot at the Rizal Memorial Coliseum on Monday.

Tolentino said the goal is to match or surpass the gold medals won by taekwondo's Pauline Lopez and golfer Mia Legaspi, along with the three silver medals in the 2013 edition held in Nanjing, China.

Boxer Leo Mhar Lobrido and volleyball player Harlene Serneche will serve as flagbearers during the opening ceremony of the second-largest multi-sport competition on the continent after the Asian Games.

"We'll train and do our best to get a medal," Lobrido said during the photo session.

The 16-year-old Lobrido from Bago City, Negros Occidental, is one of the medal contenders. He topped the



Fourth Greater Area Bay Youth Boxing Challenge in Shenzhen, China last year.

"We have potential and hopefully, we'll be competitive there," said the 18-year-old Serneche, an incoming National University freshman.

The photo shoot featured 30 athletes, including Pi Durden Wangkay and Lorraine Batalla (athletics), Jan Brix Ramiscal (Muay), siblings Charlie and Travis Ratcliff (MMA), and Rhose Almendralejo (volleyball).

The volleyball team is composed of National University's high school squad.

"It's a big pressure for me because this is only the second time I'm competing outside the country. I hope to help

the team and do well," said Almendralejo, a grade 11 student of Tay Tung High School in Bacolod City.

Philippine National Volleyball Federation president Ramon "Tats" Suzara is the chef de mission of Team Philippines.

The Filipino athletes will join 18 of 26 sports in the AYG program. These are volleyball, teqball, golf, triathlon, mixed martial arts, taekwondo, muay, athletics, boxing, cycling, weightlifting, table tennis, badminton, wrestling, aquatics, jiu-jitsu, kung-fu, and pencak silat.

Tolentino said Bahrain is ready to host 4,250 athletes, 900 team and technical officials, and 700 coaches in the games. (PNA)
