# DOTr conducts strict PUV inspection, driver testing for Undas

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna (PIA) — The Department of Transportation (DOTr) has announced that it will conduct strict inspections of public utility vehicle (PUV) drivers and operators in anticipation of the massive influx of travelers during the observance of All Saints' Day, and All Souls' Day.

These inspections will include random

drug and alcohol testing of PUV drivers, vehicle roadworthiness check, and verification of valid franchises and licenses.

In an interview, DOTr Acting Secretary Giovanni Lopez said the initiative is part of its nationwide efforts to ensure that all transport operators comply with safety regulations and that drivers are in proper condition

to ferry thousands of Filipinos returning to their provinces for Undas.

"[Inspections] are on-going. A few days [before] Undas, what we will be checking are the drivers because we will be coordinating with PDEA. I am announcing this now, so that the drivers will stop doing what they are doing, don't live with drugs, it is forbid-

den," he said.

The DOTr, in coordination with the Philippine Drug Enforcement Agency (PDEA), has intensified its campaign to eliminate the use of illegal drugs among PUV drivers. The joint operation aims to uphold road safety and protect commuters from the dangers of impaired driving.

In an advisory issued Wednesday, PhilHealth said the policy guides all regional offices, accredited healthcare providers, and beneficiaries in filing, processing, and evaluating claims for IHD-AMI cases.

"All patients with acute myocardial infarction, including those with ST-elevation (STEMI) or non-ST elevation (Non-STEMI), may avail of the package," the state insurer said.

## 30K homebuyers to join Nat'l Housing Expo

MANILA — Around 30,000 potential homebuyers are expected to attend the National Housing Expo from Oct. 23 and 24, the Department of Human Settlements and Urban Development (DHSUD) said on Wednesday.

The DHSUD and the Pag-IBIG Fund will showcase affordable housing options under the government's Expanded Pambansang

Pabahay para sa Pilipino (4PH) Program.

The event, to be held at the World Trade Center in Pasay City, will feature over 100,000 brand-new homes from the country's top 50 developers, available through the Pag-IBIG Housing Loan.

More than 30,000 Pag-IBIG Acquired Assets will also be offered at up to 40 percent discount, accord-

ing to the DHSUD.

DHSUD Secretary and Pag-IBIG Fund Chairman Jose Ramon Aliling said the Expo

## 786K villagers get medical care from SBDP-funded health stations

MANILA — The Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) on Wednesday said 785,897 residents in 620 insurgency-cleared barangays nationwide are now benefiting from 478 completed barangay health stations funded under the "Support to Barangay Development Program" (SBDP) from 2021 to 2025.

Funding for the proj-

ect totaled PHP1.98 billion, the agency added.

"Beyond the figures lies a story of hope and transformation for communities once left behind," the DILG said.

These facilities bring health services closer to families who used to travel long distances for basic medical care.

that 50 more barangay health stations are currently under construction, eight are in the procurement phase, and 82 are in pre-procurement.

Aside from health stations, the SBDP also funds key infrastructure projects such as farm-to-market roads, water supply and sanitation systems, rural electrification, agricultural facilities, housing and rehabilitation works, all identified by barangay residents through the DILG’s

“Retooled Community Support Program” (RCSP) and integrated into their Barangay Development Plans.

housing needs.

“The National Housing Expo stands as a landmark initiative that unites the entire housing sector—government agencies and private institutions alike—in fulfilling President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr.’s directive to ensure that every Filipino family has access to affordable and decent housing,” Aliling said.

He added that the

Expo forms part of the DHSUD’s National Shelter Month celebration this October, alongside regional housing fairs in Cagayan de Oro, Cebu, Iloilo, Pampanga, Bacolod, Batangas, and General Santos.

Visitors at the Expo may explore housing projects within Metro Manila and nearby provinces. A key feature of the event

should not disqualify a patient from receiving the benefit.”

The advisory also emphasized that accredited health facilities without the capability to perform percutaneous coronary intervention (PCI) or fibrinolysis must coordinate and refer patients to hospitals capable of providing these services.

Referring facilities may still claim the “Emergency Medical Services with Coordinated Referral and Interfacility Transfer (IHD-AMI-C)” package.

They are also advised to refer patients for cardiac rehabilitation as part of their medical management, even if PCI or fibrinolysis is not performed.

Cardiac rehabilitation sessions may begin during hospital admission and continue on an outpatient basis.

Patients are required to complete at least six sessions provided on different dates, supervised by a cardiac rehabilitation specialist or, where unavailable, by a cardiologist in collaboration with a physiatrist.

PhilHealth encouraged health facilities to establish dedicated cardiac rehabilitation units but noted that the absence of such units should not hinder the delivery of rehabilitation services.

The state insurer also clarified that a 24-hour hospital admission is not required for reimbursement of IHD-AMI claims, emphasizing access to timely referral, early revascularization, and cardiac rehabilitation to improve patient outcomes.

“All accredited health facilities are encouraged to forge networks to improve access and address service gaps,” PhilHealth said.

It added that referrals to facilities with similar service capabilities are also acceptable and do not automatically require transferring patients to higher-level hospitals.

allows attendees to be assessed for their Pag-IBIG Housing Loan entitlement based on income, helping them identify properties they can afford through the agency’s loan programs.

Pag-IBIG Fund Chief Executive Officer Marilene Acosta reaffirmed the agency’s commitment to making homeownership easier and more affordable for Filipino workers.

“Pag-IBIG Fund remains the largest home financier in the country. We continue to make homeownership easier through our 3-percent interest rate for socialized housing under the Expanded 4PH Program,” Acosta said.

She noted that Pag-IBIG recently reduced its interest rate to 4.5 percent per annum for

properties worth up to PHP1.8 million, available to the first 10,000 local workers and 1,000 overseas Filipino workers.

The Pag-IBIG Acquired Assets Super Sale, which offers ready-to-occupy homes at discounted prices, runs until December. Meanwhile, members seeking to upgrade their homes may avail of the Home Improvement Loan Program, which provides up to PHP300,000 for repairs or renovations.

Acosta said the fund’s strong financial position allows it to support every Filipino worker in their journey to homeownership.

## BNS federation calls for stronger support for CALABARZON nutrition volunteers

LIPA CITY, Batangas (PIA) — The Federation of Barangay Nutrition Scholars in CALABARZON (FBNS IV-A) Inc. is urging the government to provide better benefits and job security for Barangay Nutrition Scholars (BNS), as over 5,000 volunteers from across the region gathered for the 3rd Regional BNS Congress held on October 17 at the Lipa Academy for Sports, Culture and Arts.

In partnership with the National Nutrition Council (NNC) CALABARZON, the event underscored the crucial role of BNS volunteers as frontliners in promoting community nutrition and implementing the Philippine Plan of Action for Nutrition (PPAN) 2023–2028 at the grassroots level.

FBNS IV-A President Danilo S. Posion led the call to revisit and update Presidential Decree No. 1569, which mandates the appointment of at least one BNS per barangay. He emphasized that the decades-old law must be strengthened to ensure that BNS volunteers receive fair recognition, benefits, and protection from arbitrary replacement during local leadership transitions.

“We hope that the government will update PD 1569 to provide additional benefits and security of tenure for our BNS,” said Posion. Many of our scholars are replaced whenever there are changes in barangay officials, despite years of dedicated service.”

Posion added that the congress serves as an important venue for learning and capacity



building among BNS.

“This gathering allows us to enhance our knowledge and stay updated with new forms and guidelines from the national level,” he said. “As BNS, it is our duty to ensure the accuracy of data collected during Operation Timbang Plus (OPT) and nutrition surveys, especially for pregnant and lactating women.”

He encouraged fellow BNS to remain steadfast in their mission of service despite the challenges.

“Sa mga kapwa ko BNS wag po kayong susuko. Alam naman natin ang ating trabaho ay hindi lamang sa pagiging BNS kundi lumalampas pa ng saklaw at maging ang pagbibigay natin ng oras minsan ay lampas pa hanggang sa maibigay natin ang tapat na serbisyo. Mahalaga po na magkaroon tayo lagi ng puso sa ating ginagawa”.

Meanwhile, Regional Nutrition Program Coordinator Lourdes Bolante Orongan of NNC CALABARZON praised the volunteers’ unwavering dedication, describing them as the “unsung heroes” of community health.

“Our BNS are our un-

sung heroes. Despite receiving no regular pay and only minimal honorarium, their dedication and volunteerism keep our communities healthy and informed”, Orongan said.

She underscored that the congress aims to equip BNS with the latest knowledge on nutrition programs, forms, and monitoring tools, ensuring that they remain well-informed as they guide families and vulnerable groups at the barangay level.

Under PD 1569, BNS volunteers work closely with the Barangay Nutrition Committees, Local Chief Executives, and the National Nutrition Council to plan and implement local nutrition programs and ensure funding support.

As the congress concluded, the participants renewed their pledge to continue serving their communities with dedication and compassion—proving that even without regular pay, true public service is driven by heart, commitment, and the shared goal of building a well-nourished and healthier CALABARZON. ## Kiwis might help ease chronic constipation – study

ISTANBUL – Kiwis, rye bread and mineral-rich water may help relieve chronic constipation, according to guidelines in a study published in the Journal of Human Nutrition and Dietetics and Neurogastroenterology & Motility.

Around one in every six to seven people worldwide experiences chronic constipation. In the US, between 9 percent and 20 percent of adults are affected by chronic idiopathic constipation — a type of constipation with no identifiable underlying cause.

The guidelines incorporate certain foods and beverages—such as kiwis, prunes, rye bread, and water high in minerals— “and specific supplement interventions into clinical guidance, filling a long-standing gap between research and routine clinical advice,” CNN cited lead study author Eirini Dimidi as saying in an email.

“That will help clinicians give clearer, more targeted, and evidence-informed



dietary advice, and will allow people to self-manage their symptoms more effectively,” Dimidi added.

Symptoms of chronic constipation can include having fewer than three bowel movements per week, passing hard or lumpy stools, or experiencing pain or straining during bowel movements.

The guidance is intended for healthy adults with chronic idiopathic constipation and does not specifically address constipation caused by other conditions, such as neurological disorders or pregnancy.

While some recommendations might be relevant, they should be applied cautiously in these populations, as well as in children, Dimidi highlighted.

Kiwis can help in-

crease stool volume and water content, aid protein digestion, and promote smoother movement of food, fluids, and waste through the digestive system.

They also help speed up intestinal transit time and provide natural prebiotic benefits, supporting better digestion and reducing gut inflammation.

Kiwis are rich in dietary fiber, which can increase stool bulk, soften stools, and support regular bowel movements.

They also contain the enzyme actinidin, which helps break down proteins during digestion.

Eating kiwis also has the potential to improve bowel movement frequency and stool consistency in people with mild constipation. (Anadolu)

## UP Manila, TESDA launch standards for anatomy lab technicians

MANILA – The University of the Philippines Manila (UP Manila) and the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA) on Monday launched new competency standards to strengthen the country’s medical education system.

The two new qualifications are Cadaver Preservation Services Level III and Academic Simulation Services Level III, which aim to professionalize the technical staff who assist future healthcare workers in anatomy laboratories.

TESDA Secretary Jose Francisco Benitez said the initiative recognizes the indispensable contributions of anatomy and simulation laboratory technicians in shaping medical education.

“Before there’s a doctor in the operating room, there’s a technician in the anatomy lab. During every simulation, there’s someone setting up the tools, fixing the systems and keeping things running when no one’s watching,” Benitez was quoted in a news release as saying in his speech during the launch at UP Manila’s Sports and Wellness Center.

“Today, TESDA and UP Manila stand together to say they are no longer invisible. Their work, their skills, their service -- kita na, kilala na at kinikilala na natin ngayon (it is seen, it is known and it is recognized now),” he added.

The move marked the first time the government developed official competency standards for Anatomy Laboratory and General Laboratory Technician education, paving the way for standardized training and qualifications in support of medical and health sciences programs.

The Cadaver Preservation Services Level III program will train learners in the ethical handling, preservation

and management of cadavers for academic and research use.

Graduates may serve as cadaver care technicians, anatomy laboratory technicians or anatomic embalmers.

Meanwhile, the Academic Simulation Services Level III program focuses on the operation and management of simulation-based learning facilities used in health sciences education.

Successful trainees may pursue careers as simulation technicians or simulation operations specialists.

Benitez noted that as the number of medical schools continues to grow under the Doctor Para sa Bayan Act, there is a parallel need to ensure the availability of qualified laboratory and simulation staff who help deliver quality education.

The law, Republic Act 11509, establishes a “medical scholarship and return service that will help deserving medical students pursue medical education and training in the field of health and medicine” and who shall eventually

“render services in government public health offices or government hospitals in their hometown

or in any municipality in their home province or in any underserved municipality in any province, as part of their integration into the public health and medical service system.”

TESDA’s 2025 TVET (Technical-Vocational Education and Training) Skills Insights Report, titled “Behind the Scenes of Care: Labor Insights into the Auxiliary Health Workforce,” stated that each new medical school requires three to four laboratory technicians to operate effectively.

To respond to this need, TESDA and UP Manila identified six priority areas for TVET development: Anatomy Laboratory Technician, General Laboratory Technician, Cadaver Preservation, Cadaver Soft Embalming, Academic Simulation Assistant, and Simulation Technician.

The initiative forms part of the implementation of a memorandum of understanding (MOU) signed by TESDA and UP Manila in September 2024, which outlined collaboration on standards development, skills training and enterprise-based learning.

Following the MOU, TESDA held consultations with officials from

## SMC Infrastructure, Metro Pacific Tollways, complete interoperability of Luzon expressways

The long-anticipated interoperability of expressways operated by SMC Infrastructure and Metro Pacific Tollways Corp. throughout Luzon is now complete, with both firms officially launching the One RFID program Tuesday in Calamba, in ceremonies attended by President Ferdinand “Bongbong” Marcos, Jr.

“We are proud to announce the successful completion of interoperability between our electronic toll collection (ETC) systems, Autosweep and Easytrip. This latest feature will directly benefit motorists who will register for a new ETC account, as they will only need one radio frequency identification (RFID) and account to travel seamlessly across the Luzon expressway network,” both companies said in a joint statement.

The One RFID program covers all toll roads in Luzon such as Tarlac-Pangasinan-La Union Expressway (TPLEX), Subic-Clark-Tarlac Expressway (SC-TEX), North Luzon Expressway (NLEX), NLEX Connector,



Skyway System, NAIA Expressway, Manila-Cavite Expressway (CaviteX), CaviteX-C5 Link, Muntinlupa-Cavite Expressway (MCX), Cavite-Laguna Expressway (CALAX), South Luzon Expressway (SLEX), and the STAR Tollway.

Registering for the One RFID program is optional. Motorists with existing, separate Autosweep and Easytrip RFIDs and accounts may choose to join the toll interoperability program, but those who choose to maintain two separate RFID accounts, may also do so, the companies said.

This project was initiated by government through the Department of Transportation (DOTr) and the Toll Regulatory Board (TRB), in line with their mandate to improve the efficiency of the country's express-

way network.

The private operators had been working closely with government over the years, to make the vision of toll interoperability a reality.

“The road to One RFID was not easy, as it required extensive work on the part of all stakeholders. Both ETC providers made significant upgrades to their existing infrastructure to integrate their systems, while conducting rigorous testing to ensure smooth and seamless interoperability,” the firms said.

With the completion of the interoperability project, the expressway operators said their focus will now be on roll-out—making registration to the One RFID program more convenient and accessible—as well as continuous improvements to the system, to ensure overall better
