## PBBM pushes for sustainable, inclusive tourism at ASEAN Tourism Forum

MANILA – President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. on Wednesday called for sustainable and inclusive tourism as the Philippines, this year's Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) chair, formally opened the ASEAN Tourism Forum (ATF) 2026 in Cebu.

During the opening of the AFT 2026, Marcos underscored the cru-

cial role of the tourism sector as a "driver of opportunity for economies and communities."

"When tourism is inclusive, it becomes empowering. When policies are carried out with care, they become sustainable," Marcos said in a speech delivered by Tourism Secretary Christina Frasco.

"As we look to the

future, the Philippines invites all ASEAN member states and partners to move with us and be part of this journey. I share with you the sense of confidence and optimism that ASEAN tourism will continue to strive," he added.

Marcos said a major milestone under the ATF is the completion and adoption of the

### Over 13K CALABARZON households benefit from DSWD Sustainable Livelihood Program 2025

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna (PIA) — More than 13,000 households across the CALABARZON Region gained new and sustainable sources of income in 2025 as the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) IV-A rolled out expanded livelihood opportunities under its Sustainable Livelihood Program (SLP).

DSWD IV-A reported that a total of 13,792 households received P257.81 mil-

lion in livelihood assistance to support the establishment of micro-enterprises. These ventures include community stores, hog-raising, vegetable farming, duck raising, rice retailing, and other small-scale businesses aimed at strengthening local economies and promoting self-sufficiency. Of the total beneficiaries, 13,720 households have already started operating their livelihood projects.

The livelihood sup-



port covered five provinces, with Batangas recording the highest number of beneficiaries at 4,683, followed by Quezon at 3,514, Laguna at 2,718, Rizal at 1,878, and Cavite at 999, reflecting the

### DepEd chief urges LGUs to help accelerate classroom delivery

MANILA – Education Secretary Sonny Angara on Wednesday called on local government units (LGUs) to help speed up classroom delivery nationwide through a more flexible classroom construction mechanism.

Angara made the call

during a dialogue with more than 200 city and municipal mayors at the Makabagong San Juan Theater in San Juan City.

"Kapag ang LGU ang nasa unahan ng implementasyon, mas mabilis nating naaabot ang mga paaralan na pina-ka-nangangailangan

(If LGUs will be at the forefront of the implementation, we can reach priority schools faster)," Angara said.

Under the flexible framework, the DepEd will identify priority schools in the country; provide classroom designs and technical

into associations and trained in basic entrepreneurship, financial management, and cooperative operations. This approach aims to enhance not only income generation but also social cohesion and long-term enterprise sustainability.

For community leaders like Vilma Ma-

drildejeos, president of the Golden Harvest Cupang SLP Association in Bauan, Batangas, the program has created shared economic opportunities at the barangay level. Their 30-member association received P450,000 in start-up capital, which they in-

specifications; approve and review plans and variation orders; secure validation and inspections; and release project funds in tranches.

For its part, the LGUs will lead the implementation from procurement to construction in adherence with national laws and DepEd-standard designs.

They will also be in charge of managing construction defects at their own expense if DepEd standards and specifications were not met.

Once classroom constructions are completed, buildings will be considered as DepEd assets but will be under joint monitoring and audit to ensure quality.

For LGUs to participate, eligibility requirements must be submitted to the DepEd.

These include a letter of intent signifying the commitment to implement classroom

projects; authority from the Sangguniang Bayan, Panlungsod, or Panlalawigan to enter into a memorandum of agreement with DepEd; and proof of site ownership or the right to use the school site, such as proof of deed, a tax declaration, or a deed of usufruct.

Meanwhile, Angara said constructions that are still under the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) will be monitored more regularly.

“Mas regular na yung meetings namin. May ginawa kaming (Our meetings are more regular. We have formed a) Technical Working Group at least once or twice, nagmi-meeting na kami (we are conducting meetings),” he said.

Prior to the operation of the TWG, Angara said progress reports on classroom construction from the DPWH may take up to four to five months or more. (PNA)

## Over 30 people died in US due to winter storm

HOUSTON, United States – At least 34 people have died as millions of Americans braced for extreme cold gripping wide swathes of the US this week, as the dig-out from a massive winter storm that dumped mounds of snow and ice continued on Tuesday.

Cold weather alerts have been issued for much of the central and eastern US, with a polar vortex expected to set records in some parts of the southern and northeastern areas this week. That frigid front will also complicate efforts to clear snow and ice in dozens of states, as any melt will refreeze in single-digit temperatures.

Some regions may not see temperatures hit above freezing un-

til early February. The Midwest, in particular, is forecast to be hit with exceptionally frosty temperatures.

One fatality was reported in each of the states of Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio, South Carolina, and New Jersey, with two deaths reported in each Arkansas, Massachusetts, and Mississippi, alongside three fatalities each in Pennsylvania, Texas, and Louisiana, while four in Tennessee, and nine reported in New York, according to USA Today.

A woman in Kansas died due to hypothermia, another woman in Massachusetts died after being struck by snowplow, according to police, and three people died in Tennessee due to weath-

ASEAN Tourism Sector Plan 2026-2030, which sets a clear and unified course for advancing sustainable and inclusive tourism across the region.

He said the regional tourism roadmap is designed to enrich visitor experience, empower both small- and large-scale enterprises, and strengthen ASEAN’s competitiveness in the global market.

“In many ways, this roadmap reflects ASEAN’s larger direction –growth that is innovative, development that is environmentally sound, and progress that prioritizes the welfare of the people,” he said.

Marcos said the Philippines’ ASEAN chairship is guided by five strategic thrusts called “SAIL ASEAN” or “SAIL-A,” which stands for Strengthening Trade and Investment Linkages; Accelerating Digital Transformation; Integrating ASEAN’s MSME Development Agenda; Leveraging the Creative Economy and Innovation; and Advancing Sustainable and Inclusive Economies.

He said the strategic thrusts would provide direction and balance to ASEAN member-states’ shared journey as they work to boost tourism, which he described as

vested in a duck-raising and salted egg production enterprise launched in November 2025.

According to Madridejos, “Napakalaking tulong nito sa aming mga miyembro dahil nagbibigay ito ng bagong pagkakakitaan para sa amin at sa buong barangay.”

In Mabini, Batangas, Ruby Serafin, president of the Majuben’s Leading Light SLP Association, highlighted the program’s dual impact on income and personal development. “Maliban sa tulong pangkabuhatan, natuto akong makisalamuha sa aking mga kagrupa at lalong nahahasa ang aking kakayahan sa pagnenegosyo,” said Serafin.

Their 16-member group established a community store in early 2025, generating dividends for members while strengthening their skills in teamwork and small-scale business management. Ser-

afin reported receiving P4,500 in dividends by September 2025, reflecting early gains from the enterprise.

To safeguard the continuity of these livelihood projects, DSWD Field Office IV-A continues to conduct regular monitoring, mentoring, and technical assistance through its SLP project development officers. This post-implementation support is crucial in addressing operational challenges and ensuring that enterprises remain viable beyond the initial funding period.

### More than 600 residents benefit from PGC's Medical and Dental Mission in Brgy. Halang, Naic

The activity provided a wide range of free medical services, including general medical consultations, X-ray, electrocardiogram (ECG), and fasting blood sugar (FBS) testing. Dental services such as tooth extraction and dental consultation were also made available to address the oral health needs of the beneficiaries.

The medical and dental services were rendered by the healthcare professionals from the Office of the Provincial Health Officer (OPHO), who ensured the efficient delivery of quality and accessible healthcare to residents of the barangay.

The initiative reflects the continuing commitment of the provincial government to promote the health and well-being of its constituents, especially those in grassroots communities. ### PGC extends Medical and Dental Mission to Gentriseños

Another round of a successful Medical and Dental Mission was conducted by the Provincial Government of Cavite in Brgy. Pasong Camachile 1, Grand River Side, General Trias City on January 21.

The initiative benefited Gentriseños with a wide range of free health services designed to promote wellness and early detection. Medical consultations under the OPD reached 428 patients, while diagnostic services included 101 fasting blood sugar (FBS) tests, 24 ECG procedures, and 18 X-ray services. Meanwhile, 46 patients received dental care through the Rural Health Unit (RHU) of City of General Trias.

The mission was made possible through the combined expertise of the GEAMH medical team and the RHU dental team of General Trias City, who worked hand in hand to deliver efficient and compassionate care. To further support patients' recovery and well-being, free medicines were distributed by the Office of the Provincial Governor (OPG) medical team, ensuring continuity of treatment beyond the consultation.



### Health services brought closer to home for 600+ Imuseños

More than 600 residents of Barangay Malagasang II-C, City of Imus, Cavite benefited from free medical and dental services during a one-day Medical and Dental Mission on January 23. The activity was organized by the Provincial Government of Cavite's Medical Mission Team in partnership with the Office of the Provincial Health Officer, the City Health Office, and the office of Board Member Chelsea Sarno.

A total of 659 individuals availed of general medical services, including X-rays, fasting blood sugar (FBS) tests, and electrocardiograms (ECGs). In addition, 47 patients received dental extractions during the mission.

The event was also graced by Mayor Alex "AA" Advincula along with city councilors, who expressed their support for the program.

Board Member Sarno emphasized the importance of bringing essential health services directly to communities, particularly to those with limited access to healthcare. As added assistance, each patient also received five kilos of rice.

The Provincial Government of Cavite continues to roll out similar health outreach programs across the province as part of its efforts to address gaps in healthcare access, especially in rural and underserved areas.



### Kaingen residents receive free medical and dental services

On January 22, the Provincial Government of Cavite's Medical and Dental Mission Team conducted a health outreach program in Brgy. Kaingen, Kawit, benefiting more than 400 residents.

The mission provided medical consultations to 391 patients and dental services to 46 residents, along with diagnostic tests such as fasting blood sugar (FBS), electrocardiogram (ECG), and X-ray examinations. Free medicines and vitamin supplements were also distributed to further support the health needs of the beneficiaries.

## PEZA approves 18 projects worth P12.86-B in first meeting in 2026

MANILA – Eighteen new projects worth around PHP12.86 billion have been approved by the Philippine Economic Zone Authority (PEZA) Board during its first meeting this year.

In a news release on Wednesday, PEZA said three of these projects are big-ticket items worth PHP11.89 billion, involving a tourism economic zone enterprise in Parañaque City, and two economic zone development projects in Misamis Occidental and Batangas.

All these projects — covering manufacturing, IT-BPM, utilities, economic zone development, logistics, and tourism — are expected to generate 1,005 jobs across several areas and produce about USD59.74 million in projected exports, PEZA added.

The projects will be located in Calabarzon,



National Capital Region, Central Visayas, Bicol Region, Northern Mindanao and Soccsksargen.

PEZA said most of these investments are from businesses from Japan, the Netherlands, Hong Kong, Singapore and China.

The latest approvals are, however, lower than the PHP30.16 billion approved by the Board during the same period in 2025.

“Investors today are taking a more deliberate approach — prioritizing resilience, efficiency, and long-term value. What is encouraging is that the Philippines continues to offer

stable fundamentals that allow export-oriented investments to move forward with confidence,” PEZA Director General Tere-so Panga said.

“Resilience is built not just in times of expansion, but in how economies navigate transition. What we are seeing today is a steady recalibration — one that keeps the Philippines firmly in investors’ long-term plans,” he added.

## DOH says PH ready vs. Nipah, urges public vigilance

MANILA – The Department of Health (DOH) on Wednesday assured the public of the country’s preparedness against the Nipah virus, citing strengthened surveillance systems and updated response guidelines amid reported cases abroad.

In a statement, the DOH said the Nipah virus is a rare zoonotic disease, or one that originates from animals, with fruit bats identified as its primary reservoir.

Other animals such

as pigs and horses may also become infected and transmit the virus to humans.

The virus was first detected in Malaysia in 1998 and later in Singapore in 1999,

## OCD aids gov’t disaster workers through psychosocial, re-learning sessions

SANTA CRUZ, Laguna (PIA) — Recognizing the toll brought by natural hazards in 2025 on communities and government responders, the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) CALABARZON conducted a mental health check-up, psychosocial support, and re-learning sessions for disaster focal persons from government agencies and local government units.

Held from January 15 to 16, the activity gathered personnel from local disaster risk reduction and management offices (LDRRMOs), including operations and warning officers, as well as response cluster lead focal persons from regional line agencies during the Operations Family Conference (OFC).

The conference also served as a culminating activity to assess and conclude the overall regional management of disaster response operations for 2025, with the aim of further strengthening disaster preparedness and response mechanisms in the region.

“As we close the year and prepare for new challenges, it is imperative for us to convene, address pressing issues and concerns, update one another on relevant policies, undertake necessary psychosocial processing activities, and plan ahead,” said OCD CALABARZON Regional Director Carlos Eduardo Alvarez III in his remarks. “As our valued partners, it is our shared responsibility to foster this kind of collaboration.”

Alvarez emphasized



that government agencies, together with their counterparts in provincial, city, and municipal governments, play a vital role in fulfilling OCD’s mission of building safer, adaptive, and disaster-resilient Filipino communities. He added that an integrated and seamless approach to disaster response will ultimately save more lives.

“This conference is important to ensure that our coordination mechanisms and resources are aligned with our objectives and are ready to support timely, effective, and accountable disaster response. We appreciate your participation and constructive engagement as we continue to strengthen our operations moving forward,” he added.

One of the participants from the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) IV-A shared that the OFC would greatly help the agency in achieving its goals for the year.

“Kami po, sa ngalan ng aming regional director na si RD Ariel Iglesia, ay buong-buong suportang mga aktibidad, inisyatiba, at interbensiyon kaugnay ng disaster preparedness. Hangarin po natin na patuloy na mag-

ing ligtas at matatag ang ating mga komunidad. Makikipag-partner po kami muli sa ating mga frontline counterparts para sa disaster at community preparedness activities.” said Shazer Ambas of DILG IV-A.

Meanwhile, the Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) IV-A also expressed full support for the OFC, noting the importance of hearing first-hand accounts from frontline responders during disasters.

“We were able to maximize the opportunity to improve on what we experienced last year. I highly recommend that this be repeated next year so that responding units and operations teams feel that they are heard, valued, and truly part of the family,” said BFP IV-A Special Rescue Force Acting Chief Fire Inspector Reeven Ryan Bolito.

OCD CALABARZON reaffirmed its commitment to implementing programs that will improve communication, enhance coordination, and strengthen collaboration among inter-agency partners, recognizing the proactive support and dedication shown during disaster response operations. (CH/PIA-Laguna)



## DEPDev chief sees economic recovery starting in Q2 2026

MANILA – The impact of government measures to support domestic economic growth is expected to begin materializing in the second quarter of 2026, Department of Economy, Planning and Development (DEPDev) Secretary Arsenio Balisacan said Thursday.

Balisacan made the statement after the Philippine economy grew by 3 percent in the fourth quarter of 2025, slower than the 3.9 percent in the previous quarter and the 5.3 percent recorded a year earlier, according to the latest Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) data.

The PSA said full-year growth settled at 4.4 percent, below the 5.7 percent posted in 2024 and under the revised 4.8 to 5 percent target.

On the demand side, fourth-quarter exports of goods rose 22.8 percent, imports of services increased by 4.2 percent, household consumption grew by 3.8 percent, and government spending expanded by 9.1 percent.

For the full year, exports of goods grew by 14.1 percent, government consumption by 9.1 percent, imports of services by 6.1 percent, and imports of goods by 4.7 percent.

The government targets GDP growth of 5 to 6 percent this year and 5.5 to 6.5 percent in 2027, with export growth targets of 2 percent and 3 percent, respectively. The foreign exchange assumption for both

years is PHP58.60 to a US dollar.

In a briefing, Balisacan said a return to at least 5 percent growth is possible by the second quarter, noting that achieving the full-year target would require growth to reach that level by then.

“That’s the goal anyway, to go to the five to six percent for the entire year. On exactly what month or quarter, it’s something definitely I couldn’t say but, yes, to be able to go to 5 to 6 percent, you have to grow 5 percent by Q2,” he said.

He attributed the slowdown to weather- and climate-related disruptions, issues surrounding anomalous flood control projects, and global economic uncertainties, which dampened construction activity and private consumption. Domestic demand growth slowed to 0.7 percent in the fourth quarter, while full-year expansion reached 3.7 per-

cent.

Balisacan stressed the need to restore investor and consumer confidence through governance reforms, stronger accountability, improved project quality, and better use of public funds.

He also cited the importance of improving disaster preparedness, early warning systems, and the capacity of the state weather bureau.

For infrastructure, he said the government will accelerate the completion of ongoing projects while strengthening anti-corruption safeguards to support economic recovery and achieve more sustainable growth.

“These reforms protect public funds, strengthen our institutions, build a more resilient, inclusive economy, and ultimately, rebuild trust between government and the people we serve,” Balisacan said. (PNA)

virus cases were recently reported in West Bengal, India, with around 100 identified close contacts currently under monitoring by Indian health authorities.

DOH Assistant Secretary Albert Domingo said the Nipah virus is not new to the Philippines.

“Nakita na ito noong 2014 pa sa Sultan Kudarat, kung saan nagkaroon ng 17 na kaso (This was seen in 2014 in Sultan Kudarat where 17 cases were recorded),” he said.

He added patients

initially presented flu-like symptoms, while some developed serious conditions such as encephalitis and meningitis.

“Nakuha ito ng mga nagkasakit mula sa pagkain ng karne ng kabayo at paglapit sa taong may sakit (Those who got sick were infected after eating meat horse and close contact with infected individuals),” he said.

After the 2014 incident, no further Nipah virus cases were detected.

The DOH advised the public to avoid contact with bats and other sick animals, ensure that meat products are

approved by the National Meat Inspection Service, and to always cook food thoroughly to reduce the risk of infection.

The health department reiterated its call for calm, saying it is closely monitoring global developments and is prepared to respond should any suspected case arise in the country. (PNA)

“The game plan today was to limit their import, so it's still 27-27. Our only backup plan was to try to limit their other players, we were able to do it. Offensively, I just said attack, attack, attack always,” said Adamson head coach Mike Fermin.

“This win really comes with maturity. We're just pounding them and instilling in them that every game or every training, you treat this like your last. We always just think, we're not in the top four now. That's what fuels us to be better,” he added.

Artango finished with 24 points, five rebounds, four assists, and three steals, while Gomez chipped in 13 points, five steals, two rebounds, and one assist. Noah Bautista contributed 10 points,



five rebounds, three blocks, two assists, and one steal, while Mac Jenodia and Fran Flores had eight points each.

Jude Eriobu led Ateneo with 27 points, 27 rebounds, four blocks, and one steal followed by Noah Banal (11 points, six rebounds, and one assist), Ziv Espinas (11 points and seven rebounds), and Jay-M Leal (nine points, five assists, four rebounds, one steal, and one block).
